

Discharge Instructions: Transurethral Resection of the Prostate (TURP) - GU

What To Expect

- It is common to experience bladder discomfort after TURBT. It may feel like you need to urinate more often and/or with an increased sense of urgency. You may also feel a sense of pressure in the lower abdomen. These symptoms are not dangerous and typically go away within a couple days. If they last longer, please contact your doctor.
- Pink-tinged urine is common for a few days after TURBT and is not dangerous. If it lasts longer, please contact your doctor.

Restrictions

- You may shower or take a tub bath the day after surgery.
- You may drive the day after procedure.
- For 24 hours after your procedure, do not life anything heavier than 10 pounds and avoid strenuous activity. After 24 hours, you may return to normal physical activity.
- If you stopped blood thinner or aspirin medication before your procedure, it is generally safe to resume the medication 2 days after the procedure, unless your doctor gives you other instructions.
- If you took other types of medications before your surgery, you can start them again immediately.

Pain Control

Standard pain medications usually do not help bladder discomfort after this procedure. A few days
of taking a bladder-relaxing medication such as oxybutynin (Ditropan®) may help relieve the feelings
of frequency and urgency. These medications commonly cause temporary dry mouth and,
occasionally, constipation. Drinking 2-3 quarts of water a day and taking a stool softener such as
bisacodyl (Dulcolax®) may be helpful. Check with your doctor to make sure you do not have any
fluid restrictions.

Diet

 You may resume your previous diet. We recommend you begin with lighter foods and if that does not upset your stomach, progress to a regular diet.

Call Us If...

- bladder discomfort (increased urge to urinate or a need to urinate more frequently) lasts more than
 a 2 days
- your Foley catheter is not draining or if you are leaking around the insertion site
- blood in the urine that lasts more than a 2 days
- blood clots in the urine
- you cannot urinate
- you have new, intense pain in your side or back
- you develop a fever of 101° F (38.3°C) or higher or if you have a fever with chills or sweats
- you cannot eat or drink without vomiting

Follow Up Care

- You should be scheduled for a follow up appointment in the clinic about 1 to 2 weeks after your procedure.
- At that visit, you will receive the final pathology report of the prostate tissue that was removed and discuss any further recommendations or treatments.
- You will go home from the hospital with a Foley catheter to drain urine. The catheter will likely be removed at the follow up appointment, unless your urologist has discussed otherwise.
- If you left the hospital with a Foley catheter to drain your urine, it will likely be removed at this visit, unless otherwise discussed with you by your urologist.
- Since this appointment is very important, please contact the clinic if you do not have one scheduled or if you need to change the date or time.
