

# Discharge Instructions: Post Op Hemi- or Total Thyroidectomy

## What To Expect

• Your neck will be sore for several days. You may be hoarse or have a sore throat for a few days.

## Wound Care

- Your neck incision will be covered with Dermabond <sup>™</sup> (skin glue), steri-strips (thin sticky strips placed across the wound to hold skin edges together), and Bacitracin<sup>®</sup> cream. You may also have a dressing.
- It is normal to have a small amount of oozing from the incision for the first 1-2 days. You may ooze reddishcolored fluid, especially if you take a blood thinner like aspirin, but you should not have fresh bleeding.
- Do not remove the Dermabond<sup>™</sup> or the steri-strips.
- If only Bacitracin<sup>®</sup> cream is used, stop applying the cream after 2 days.

## **Pain Control**

- We will provide you with a prescription for opioid pain medication such as hydrocodone with acetaminophen (Norco<sup>®</sup>). Take it every 4-6 hours if you need it, but you don't have to use them if you are not having pain. If opioid medications are too strong, you can take acetaminophen (Tylenol<sup>®</sup>). You may take ibuprofen (Advil<sup>®</sup>/Motrin<sup>®</sup>) after the first 1-2 days. Follow the instructions on the bottle.
- If you take an opioid medication that contains acetaminophen, **do not take more acetaminophen**. **The recommended maximum daily dose of acetaminophen is 3000 milligrams (mg)**. Check all medication labels. Acetaminophen is found in over-the-counter and prescription medications.

### Restrictions

- Do not lift anything that weights more than 5 pounds and no strenuous activities for 3 weeks.
- Do not drive (or operate heavy machinery) if you are taking opioid pain medication.
- You can gradually return to your normal activities after 2 weeks, as tolerated.

#### Call Us If...

- your neck has swelling or your drain suddenly has increased output
- you are hoarse for more than a few days after surgery or have shortness of breath or difficulty breathing
- you have bleeding that does not stop after you put pressure on the area
- you develop severe, uncontrolled pain at the site of your surgery
- the area around the incision or biopsy site becomes inflamed or reddened
- you have a fever of 100.4°F (38°C) or higher
