

# Discharge Instructions: Post Op Parathyroidectomy

## What To Expect

- Your neck will be sore for several days. You may be hoarse or have a sore throat for a few days.
- Remember to take your medications as ordered, including thyroid and/or calcium supplements.

## Wound Care

- Your neck incision will be covered with Dermabond™ (skin glue), steri-strips (thin sticky strips placed across the wound to hold skin edges together). You may also have a dressing.
- It is normal to have a small amount of oozing from the incision for the first 1-2 days. You may ooze reddish-colored fluid, especially if you take a blood thinner like aspirin, but you should not have fresh bleeding.
- Do not remove the Dermabond™ or the steri-strips.

## Pain Control

- Take acetaminophen (Tylenol®) or ibuprofen (Advil®/Motrin®) for pain. If this doesn't control your pain, call us and we may prescribe something stronger.
- If you take an opioid medication that contains acetaminophen, **do not take more acetaminophen. The recommended maximum daily dose of acetaminophen is 3000 milligrams (mg).** Check all medication labels. Acetaminophen is found in over-the-counter and prescription medications.

## Restrictions

- Do not lift anything that weights more than 15 pounds and no strenuous activities for 30 days.
- Do not drive (or operate heavy machinery) if you are taking opioid pain medication.
- You can gradually return to your normal activities after 2 weeks, as tolerated.

## Call Us If...

- You have numbness/tingling in fingers, toes, or around your mouth
- your neck has swelling or your drain suddenly has increased output
- you are hoarse for more than a few days after surgery or have shortness of breath or difficulty breathing
- you have bleeding that does not stop after you put pressure on the area
- you develop severe, uncontrolled pain at the site of your surgery
- the area around the incision or biopsy site becomes inflamed or reddened
- **you have a fever of 100.4°F (38°C) or higher**
