Discharge Instructions: MOHS Closure

What To Expect

You may have a sore throat after the procedure because of the breathing tube used during surgery. This will go away over the next few days.

Wound Care

- Your incision will be covered with sterile strips or bolster dressing.
- Do not remove the Dermabond™ or the steri-strips.
- May apply ice pack over the incision 10-15 minutes every hour first 24-48 hours, except when sleeping.
- It is normal to have a little oozing from the incision for the first 1-2 days. You may ooze reddish-colored fluid, especially if you take a blood thinner like aspirin, but you should not have fresh bleeding.

Pain Control

- We may give you a prescription for an opioid pain medication such as hydrocodone with acetaminophen (Norco®). Take it every 4-6 hours if you need it for pain.
- If opioid medications are too strong, you can take acetaminophen (Tylenol®). Follow the instructions on the bottle.
- If you take an opioid medication that contains acetaminophen, do not take more acetaminophen. The
 recommended maximum daily dose of acetaminophen is 3000 milligrams (mg). Check all medication
 labels. Acetaminophen is found in over-the-counter and prescription medications.

Diet

If you do not have any dietary restrictions, you may resume your previous diet.

Restrictions

- Do not lift anything that weights more than 5 pounds and no strenuous activities for 3-4 weeks.
- Do not drive (or operate heavy machinery) if you are taking opioid pain medication.
- You can gradually return to your normal activities after 2 weeks, as tolerated.

Call Us If...

- you have bleeding that does not stop after you put pressure on the area
- you develop severe, uncontrolled pain at the site of your surgery
- the area around the incision or biopsy site becomes inflamed or reddened
- you have a fever of 100.4°F (38°C) or higher
